## Assignment:

- 1. Read the text intensively for October 26th
- 2. Lessons October 26th: group work:
  - a. make sure you understand the text
  - b. analyse the text focusing on the following aspects:
    - setting (time, place, environment)
    - characters: portrayal of the detective (and maybe helper/assistant) and his/her method of work, portrayal of the criminal(s) and of minor characters
    - plot (simple/complicated), type of crime
    - narrative technique: structure (chronological/flash back, climax/anticlimax, clues, how is the reader introduced to the problem etc.?) and point of view (e.g. omniscient narrator/author or participant in the story)
    - ideology: attitudes to society, criminals, sex-roles, morals and social norms, violence, the law)
    - effect: to whom does the text appeal? message/function?
  - c. prepare an oral presentation of your analysis of the text
  - d. sum up the characteristics of crime fiction in the period your text belongs to
